After Easter was over, I heard lots of great comments about the BREAD. We had actual *real* bread for communion on Palm Sunday and Easter! There was, however, just one problem: the church mice probably got fat from all of those CRUMBS that the bread left behind. As a result, I'm interested in trying the following recipe that comes from Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. I've heard it makes less crumbs and is easy to hold, with the added bonus of being delicious.

If you are also a baker and know how to follow a recipe, I would love to have your helping hands make a few loaves that we can freeze and use week-to-week. Or if you feel like googling recipes for communion bread, we could have ourselves a communion-bread bake-off, March Madness style. I'm open to both your ideas and your spirit of helpfulness!

P.S. Do I know that bakeries make bread all the time? Yes, I know. However I have some experience with this. Sometimes when a variety of people are in charge of purchasing the bread, sometimes we get a seeded rye bread or garlic knots for the body of Christ, and that seems like it might not be ideal.



From Luther Seminary to your table

Sift dry ingredients together three times: (important!)

2 c whole wheat flour 1 c white flour 1 & 1/4 tsp baking powder 1 & 1/4 tsp salt

Stir in 4 tsp oil. Set aside.

Mix wet ingredients together until dissolved:

3/4 cup + 2 Tbsp very hot water (minimum of 180 degrees F)

3 Tbsp honey

3 Tbsp molasses

Add wet ingredients to dry ingredients and mix well. Dough should be slightly sticky. Do not knead.

Divide into four balls and flatten each into a 1/4 inch thick disk.

With a knife, score the top of each loaf into eight pie-shaped sections, so that the sections can be more easily broken off while serving. Alternatively, you could score a cross onto the loaf.

Lay the loaves on a baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and brush the tops of the loaves with oil. Bake an additional 5-8 minutes. Let cool.

Yield: four 8 oz. loaves. Each loaf serves 60-70 people, depending upon the size of the piece given. The loaves freeze well.

A well-used, well-loved recipe

Luther Seminary's communion bread recipe has been used here for more than 25 years. It is baked by Luther Seminary dining services staff and served as part of our weekly Holy Communion service in chapel each Wednesday.

This recipe is known throughout the country as one of the best tasting and easiest to make. It's become quite popular! In July 2012 Luther Seminary dining services staff baked an estimated 1,900 loaves and Fed-Ex-ed them to the ELCA's youth gathering in New Orleans for their Sunday Eucharist!

Use batik, a unique fabric-dying method, to create flags celebrating the good news of Christ's resurrection.



What you need:

- · Colored chalk
- White linen fabric
- Washable gel glue
- Acrylic craft paint
- Textile medium
- Paintbrushes

What you do:

- 1. Cut fabric to the desired size and shape. Set it on a flat, protected surface. With chalk, lightly sketch an Easter design or message.
- 2. Completely cover the chalk lines with gel glue. Let dry.
- 3. Mix equal parts paint and textile medium. Paint the flag with that mixture, which makes paint permanent. Let dry.
- 4. Soak the dried fabric in warm water a few minutes. Then gently peel away the glue to reveal the unpainted areas. Lay flat to dry.
- 5. Hang the flags and celebrate!
